FREED CENTER FOR LEADERSHIP AND SERVICE GROUNDBREAKING

Vanguard University officially broke ground on the Freed Center for Leadership and Service on October 25, 2022. In addition to messages from university officials and City of Costa Mesa mayor, the audience—including Vanguard administration, faculty, staff, students, and student athletes—were led in worship by the Vanguard Worship Collective.

With construction expected to be complete in 2024, the three-story, 60,000-square-foot Freed Center will provide a premier athletic and learning hub in the heart of campus. As the third executed project of VU’s 30-year Master Plan, the Freed Center will be home to VU Athletics’ 19 sports teams and house the Kinesiology academic program—VU’s fastest growing academic program—featuring classrooms, interactive labs, and study spaces.

In honor of the \$10 million gift, the new facility is named after the Freeds, a local philanthropic Christian family who believes in the mission of Vanguard. Before the ceremony, hundreds of VU students gathered in the Waugh Student Center to greet Mrs. Evelyn Freed. The crowd cheered and thanked her for investing in the future impact on generations of Vanguard students.

“As a Christian family who believes in the mission of Vanguard University, we were proud to be able to gift the funds needed to help build this state-of-the-art facility,” said Evelyn Freed. “The Freed Center will be a refuge for students; a space at the heart of the campus where they can gather, learn and compete. It’s just one of many ways the century-old learning institution is growing to meet changing times, while also still fostering intellectual development, moral maturity, and spiritual vitality of its students for the public good.”

The Freed Center signifies milestone two of *Imagine: The Campaign for Vanguard University*. It was selected as the next project of the campus master plan because it will complete the vision for a dynamic student life core of the campus, as it crowns the University’s decade-long investment in renovated residence halls, outdoor athletics fields, and the Waugh Student Center, which features a dining hall, recreation sports gym, fitness center, and space for all students to gather.

“Vanguard University is deeply grateful to the Freed family. As a result of their gracious gift, we will now have a home for our burgeoning Kinesiology program and a space where student athletes can learn and refine resilience in body and spirit,” said Vanguard President Michael J. Beals, Ph.D. “We see a bright future where we can better serve generations of students and coaches, providing student-athletes a space for the highest levels of athletic competition; where they can grow individually and as a team.”



INTRODUCING THE PATTY ARVIELO SCHOOL OF BUSINESS AND MANAGEMENT

On April 19, 2023, nearly 800 cheering students, faculty, staff, and supporters surprised an unsuspecting Patty Arvielo with a “take your breath away” moment. Patty’s husband, Rick, unveiled the name of VU’s soon to be launched Patty Arvielo School of Business and Management. The Arvielos have partnered with Vanguard’s vision in sponsoring the largest academic donation in the university’s 103-year history.

“I’ve never been so surprised in my life,” said Patty Arvielo, teary-eyed after the reveal. “For someone who didn’t think she was smart—or fit the profile of what smart means in America—my story is important, and I share it to empower you. Because that’s what this country offers and that is why our grandparents and parents came to this great country, to offer us the opportunities to succeed! I’m so blessed to be here with my husband, my kids, my friends and coworkers. I love this with all my heart. And now, I have more *familia*—so thank you.”

“At this moment of growth for Vanguard University, we are grateful for the support and partnership of the Arvielos,” said VU President Michael J. Beals, Ph.D. “We are honored to align our business programs under Patty Arvielo’s name because of who she is—a phenomenal business leader and role model for Hispanic, female and all students whose life story and work demonstrate what is possible. We recognize the impact that Patty Arvielo’s namesake and support will have on generations of students as Vanguard prepares them for a life of Christ-centered leadership and service.”

VU business student Kaitlyn Velazquez ’24 also shared what the Arvielo’s recognition personally means to her. “As a Latina pursuing a career in business, it is so

inspiring to be able to feel represented by someone who has made a name for herself in the pathway [of business that] I have always dreamed of. Knowing how much my parents sacrificed in order to best set me up for success, and seeing everything that Mrs. Arvielo has accomplished, gives me even more hope for my future in this field.”

The Patty Arvielo School of Business and Management will officially launch in the 2024-2025 academic year and will serve undergraduate and graduate residential, distance and non-traditional students in business, communication, organizational psychology and people operations.



The transformational gift from the Arvelos will build upon VU's legacy throughout the past five decades of preparing students to become leaders in business by combining Christian faith, in-depth knowledge, and character development with a strong liberal arts foundation. The gift will allow VU to build upon its success to establish a missionally-aligned, market-focused, compelling, innovative, and impactful school in the heart of Orange County that will develop tens of thousands of competent, character-rich business leaders prepared to make a positive impact in a complex and rapidly changing world.

The establishment of the Patty Arvielo School of Business and Management marks a significant milestone for Hispanic women nationally, as it is the first school

of business in the United States to be named after a Latina. As the daughter of a proud Mexican immigrant mother, Patty Arvielo is a self-made, award-winning entrepreneur.

She began her career at age 16, learning the mortgage industry from the ground up before co-founding New American Funding in Tustin, California in 2003 and growing it into one of the largest independent mortgage lenders in the country and the largest Latina-owned private mortgage company in the nation, with a servicing portfolio of over 241,000 loans for \$63.9 billion. The company's Latino Focus and New American Dream initiatives were launched by Patty Arvielo with the goal being to enhance the quality of the lending experience for Latino and Black homebuyers.

A MORE BEAUTIFUL AND SECURE CAMPUS

Vanguard University and City of Costa Mesa leaders celebrated the completion of the Landmark Campaign, which included the monument sign on the corner of Newport Boulevard and Fair Drive. The April 8, 2022 celebration featured a ribbon cutting, dedication, time of worship, and an opportunity to thank the Lord for his continued blessing upon Vanguard.

“This is a project we’ve been looking forward to implementing,” said Vanguard President Michael J. Beals Ph.D., “as a way for Vanguard’s physical presence in the community to truly mirror that of the impactful work we are doing to equip and prepare our students to make a difference in society.”

The funding for the project was raised throughout a month-long campaign. Alumni, friends, faculty, and staff contributed more than \$535,000 toward the project. At over 20 feet tall, the Vanguard University monument

sign is now visible from the 55 freeway, Fair Drive, and Newport Boulevard. New fencing and landscaping, including 21 accent trees flank the monument sign, beautifying and securing the campus perimeter.



CALIFORNIANS FOR ALL

Vanguard University is entering its second year as an Orange County College Corps Consortium member, and its impact has already been exponential for students and the Orange County community. In 2021, the university partnered with Concordia University Irvine and Irvine Valley College to mobilize 200 students to serve in local neighborhoods. In return, these students receive up to \$10,000 annually to help cover the cost of living and educational expenses, as well as professional development that they can put on their résumé upon graduation.

The goal of this state-funded program is to create debt-free pathways to college while engaging students in their local community. By serving in areas that address

K-12 education, food insecurity, and environmental stewardship, the students are simultaneously exposed to opportunities that help them grow professionally and expand their horizons.

For Keila Gonzalez Reyes '23, the College Corps grant allowed her to complete her practicum for her Early Childhood Education program while benefiting from real-world experience that she was deprived of during her early college career. "During the pandemic, I didn't really have any opportunities to gain experience," she explained. "I was almost a senior [when I applied to College Corps]—I had no experience and no internships yet."

But her acceptance as a College Corps fellow was more than a

means to reach graduation. It was also a way to serve in community programs that supported her family throughout her life. "I was excited to start being a part of the community and gaining experience for my own growth, but also to be able to make an impact on others, because I received so much help from my community members," Gonzalez Reyes expressed. "Now it's my turn to give back."

Gonzalez Reyes is just one of many students who is actively serving in areas that have been a personal resource. Shelley Youd, Director of College Corps at Vanguard University, has witnessed numerous students giving back to the very programs that supported them and their families. Second Harvest, for example, is an Orange County College Corps partner and an organization that gathers food from local farms and redistributes it to food pantries in the area. "Our students are some of the recipients [of that food], so when we talk to students who are surviving off of and getting additional nourishment for their family through Living Well on our campus, they're getting that because our students at Second Harvest are doing that work," Youd said.





As of March 2023, Vanguard fellows had clocked roughly 17,000 hours of volunteer work in the community, making a difference in the lives of their neighbors and being the hands and feet of Jesus. With service at the core of Vanguard’s mission, the university’s involvement in College Corps has come to be a reflection of its heartbeat for the community. In fact, Youd shared that there have been many students who continue to serve in some capacity after they have completed their required hours for the program.

“I had one student ask me if, when she’s done with her hours, does she have to stop [serving]?” Youd said. This student served at Meals on Wheels five days a week. She shared with Youd the joy of bringing fellowship to people who so desperately needed connection and the value she received in return by learning from an older generation. “She’s bringing them dignity, and then she’s receiving a relationship that she appreciates enough that she wants to go back and work there three days a week when she doesn’t have to,” Youd said.

The Orange County College Corps Consortium is a two-year program and will be up for renewal in 2024. Having witnessed the tangible impact that it has had on the community both on and off campus, Youd hopes that the grant will be renewed as a continual opportunity to make a lasting impact in Orange County.

A LEGACY OF CARE



COACH RUSS DAVIS JOINED VANGUARD AS AN ASSISTANT COACH IN 1996 AFTER BEING RECOGNIZED AS ONE OF CALIFORNIA'S TOP HIGH SCHOOL BASKETBALL COACHES. IT WAS NOT LONG BEFORE A HEAD COACH POSITION OPENED UP, AND HE BEGAN HIS TENURE AS THE HEAD WOMEN'S BASKETBALL COACH AT VU.

Twenty-seven years later, he is a nationally recognized coach with countless accolades, including seven Coach of the Year awards from the NAIA and WBCA (Women's Basketball Coaches Association) collectively.

Davis' teams have made it to the NAIA National Championship 24 times and appeared in 207 straight national polls. They have been ranked No. 1 in the nation 44 times. This is just the tip of the iceberg of Davis' numerous successes, all of which he attributes to his teams.

"Those awards are nice because I consider them team awards," Davis said, "but basketball is fifth on our list of priorities in our program." Davis does not hide that character is the most essential aspect of being on the Vanguard women's basketball team. "You're only going to be a basketball player for four years, but you're going to be out in society for the next 60 or 70 years; what's really important?" he explained. "You need to be on time, look people in the eye, and have an incredible work ethic and respect for others."

It is one thing to have high expectations for your team; it is another altogether to lead by example and live that out every day. Melissa Akullu '24, a senior women's basketball player,

spoke about Davis' humility and excellence in his coaching. "One thing that I noticed from him that I haven't noticed from many other coaches is that he'll come back and say, 'that's my fault,'" Akullu said. "For a head coach to be able to do that and have that humility—that's something that touched my heart."

Off the court, Davis exemplifies genuine care, a core element of the Vanguard spirit. Akullu reflected on several memories in which he offered to bring breakfast for players, asked the team to pray for someone, encouraged them to support other sports teams at VU, or invited others not on the team to join them for a meal. "He is always encouraging us to be present for the community through prayer," said Akullu.

For Davis, caring for people this way seems like the best way to give back to a community that has supported him through life's most significant hardships. In 2019, Davis was diagnosed with stage 4 cancer. "The support I got from the student body—I tear up just talking about it," he said.

In hindsight, Davis believes that he made it through the rigorous cancer treatments to share the hope of the Gospel. "God gave me a pedestal and a platform to share His goodness and how I



persevered through this because it was in His will," Davis said. In spite of ongoing treatments and countless surgeries, Davis is steadfast in his commitment to Vanguard, and it shows in the dedication of the women on his team.

"He was down for a long period of time," said Akullu, "but his ability to come back and still want to do so much for the game...it's something that everyone can look at and say 'I want to be like that guy.'"

In honor of Davis, Vanguard is accepting gifts to name a portion of the Freed Center for Leadership and Service. Donations will provide a dynamic athletics and learning center for students that equips them for success and commemorates the integrity of Coach Russ Davis.

LOVE AND WISDOM

The education system was one of the most significantly affected sectors during the COVID-19 pandemic. Although we've seen many strides forward after students and educators returned to traditional learning environments, the pandemic brought to light some significant challenges that the education system was already facing. Anxiety, depression, and other mental health concerns caused tension among students and educators, making learning a hurdle to overcome instead of an experience to inspire and motivate.

Jeff Hittenberger, Ph.D., Dean of the School of Education at Vanguard University, has been at the forefront of an effort to integrate love and wisdom into the education system in Orange County. Having previously served as the Chief Academic Officer for the Orange County Department of Education, he had a front-row seat to the disruption affecting people's lives and their experience within the education system. He also currently hosts *Education for Love and Wisdom*, a podcast out of Vanguard that discusses themes of love

and wisdom and what it looks like to integrate them into the education process.

“Feelings of isolation can lead to fear and anger, and then what you get is people at odds with each other because they’re carrying around a lot of anger that gets expressed in how they engage with the school or community,” explained Hittenberger. “We really needed a whole bunch of love and wisdom to come flowing into situations where people were distressed.”

When Hittenberger stepped into the role of Dean for Vanguard University’s newly established School of Education, he made it a priority to build upon the values that Vanguard already had in place and intentionally integrate these themes into the way that students and faculty interact with each other and their communities.

“Education for love and wisdom is not an invention,” Hittenberger said. “But it’s capturing something Vanguard has always been about and applying it specifically to the PreK-12 schooling environment.”

Vanguard School of Education students are learning first to be sources of love and wisdom from their professors. As they experience what it looks like in action, they are becoming equipped to carry those practices into their classrooms as student teachers and in the future. “We have a strong emphasis on spiritual formation, even in our classes,” Hittenberger said. “We open class by creating a forum in which people can share, and then if there’s something they want people to pray with them about, other students can be involved in praying with them.”

This is just one example of how students are learning to create a “community of care” inside the classroom, encouraging supportive relationships that help students thrive academically, socially, and emotionally. Not only does this encourage students to empathize with each other, but it also allows teachers to identify students who may need access to more expert care.

“What we want to do is equip our teacher candidates to be the kind of teachers who can bring love and wisdom to their classrooms and schools and communities. And by doing that, make a profoundly positive difference in the lives of students and families,” Hittenberger said.

Vanguard’s School of Education also partners with several school districts in Orange County to equip educators with tools to bring love and wisdom into their classrooms. Three times a year, they invite 40 educators from local districts onto campus for a Teacher Education Advisory Council meeting that features the theme of education for love and wisdom. This gives the School of Education an opportunity to hear the thoughts of key partners, have a conversation about educational strategies, and show genuine appreciation for the work of these educational partners who daily bless the lives of the students they serve.

While love and wisdom have always been core values of Vanguard, Hittenberger notes that giving specificity to the vision and common language of the School of Education has helped them think about how they represent Christ daily. “It acts as an accountability measure: am I living in love and wisdom right now? I’m feeling my stresses and my anxieties, but can I come back and reset, give those to God, and embrace and reaffirm love and wisdom in the center of my life in Christ?” he expressed.

“Whether we’re going into business, education, psychology, or theater...in every one of those domains, there is disruption and distress,” Hittenberger said, “and to come with the love of Christ and bring God’s wisdom into those situations, that brings about positive change in the lives of the people we interact with.”

GIVING DAY GENEROSITY FUELS SOCCER TEAM DEVELOPMENT

Vanguard Giving Day 2022 saw an incredible outpouring of generosity. The \$425,000 raised throughout the online giving campaign supported 40 initiatives from across campus, from scholarships to university endowment to research equipment. The women's soccer team raised more than \$27,000 in the annual fundraiser thanks to 144 gifts from former athletes, families, and other donors.

Lauren Mascaro '07, former head women's soccer coach, sees Giving Day as a tradition that commemorates community support and care for students. During Giving Day 2022, the team reached out via social media, email, and phone calls. Funds from the 24-hour fundraising campaign will be used in part to purchase Bible study curriculum and support team community outreach opportunities.

The soccer team's values are centered around discipline, respect, servant leadership, and grace. Mascaro believes in developing habits that keep her scholar-athletes rooted in Christ. Off the field, players set apart time to share devotionals, testimonies, and prayers with each other. They value the support of mentors, and the community and keep accountability for each other.

"Every woman who comes through this program will be a leader in their life...as a mom, in their community, in the church, and at work," Mascaro said. "We aim to help students discover their faith and make it their own because we realize that their walk with the Lord is a lifelong journey."

Sophomore forward Francesca Lindstrom leans on her faith for guidance as she balances collegiate sports and education. "Our team prays before every practice, we share prayer requests or anything that is going on in our lives," says Lindstrom. "This is a great way for our team to stay connected to God and be mindful of what everyone is going through."

During last year's campaign, the team focused on connecting with as many families, alumni, friends, and donors as possible. Through this strategy of focusing on relationships, the athletes engaged with donors, often hearing their memories of Vanguard and sharing their personal stories.

"Donors are a huge part of us being able to execute our team and spiritual initiatives and have the kind of impact we strive for to be a nationally-recognized program for impacting the kingdom of God through soccer," said Mascaro. "We are thankful knowing that we have so many people willing to sacrifice to support us."

Since 2020, Vanguard Giving Day has resulted in 4,500 gifts totaling more than \$1.1 million toward academic, athletic, and student life initiatives. Make an impact during our next Vanguard Giving Day on November 9, 2023.
